The second-largest and oldest pedestrian zone in Germany is an inviting shopping area, where a large selection of specialist stores and branches of chain stores has something for every taste.

A warm welcome to Bonn!

Beethoven, culture, museums, botanical gardens, the former Government District, the romantic Rhine – there's a lot to discover in a day in Bonn.

You can walk around Bonn's city centre on your own or join one of our guided tours. Choose your favourite guided tour from a wide range of different themes!

We recommend the big tour of the city in the popular open-top bus (daily at 2 pm in the summer months). On this tour you will learn a lot about Bonn and Bad Godesberg, while enjoying wonderful views of the Rhine and the Siebengebirge hills. Afterwards you will see the main sights of Bonn's city centre on foot. (duration: approx. 2.5 hours)

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You can plan a visit to the city exactly as you wish, combining various components to make a programme for the day...

Visit the Museum Mile (duration: approx. 2-3 hours)

From the city centre it is a convenient journey of only a few minutes on tram routes 16, 63 and 66 to Bonn's Museum Mile, with institutions that attract around two million visitors each year. Well-planned permanent exhibitions and highly regarded temporary exhibitions present subjects related to society, politics, technology, art, culture and nature.

The museums on the Museum Mile put on varied supporting programmes. Every year in May and June they get together for the Museum Mile Festival.



Visit the Beethoven House (duration: approx. 1-2 hours)

Ludwig van Beethoven was born in 1770 in the Beethoven House in Bonngasse. Now home to the world's largest Beethoven collection, it is devoted to

preserving the memory of the famous musician and composer and to research. In the Digital Beethoven House you can experience music in visible form.

In Bonn there are more than 30 museums, many of them in the city centre. Did you know that the famous Neanderthal Man can be seen in the LVR-Landesmuseum Bonn?



Visit the former Government District (duration: approx. 1-2 hours)

The former Government District (Bundesviertel) is a symbol of the first successful German democracy. It represents the transformation of Bonn from its previous status as capital of the Federal Republic of Germany to an international business centre. Since 1996 Bonn has been the German city of the United Nations and has evolved into a centre of international cooperation. Trace the Path of Democracy to important sites of contemporary history such as Villa Hammerschmidt and the former plenary chamber of the Bundestag!

Visit the House of History (Haus der Geschichte; free admission). Groups can book their own guide at Bonn-Information for the Path of Democracy.



Visit the Southern Quarter and Botanical Gardens (duration: approx. 2 hours)

Bonn's Südstadt (Southern Quarter) with its magnificent house façades was built between the end of the 19th and the early 20th century. Here you will find appealing pubs, cafés and restaurants. The Botanical Gardens with their open spaces and hothouses display a variety of native and exotic plants. They can be reached by means of an easy walk from Kaiserplatz in the city centre along the beautiful avenue Poppelsdorfer Allee (approx. 1.2 km).

Visit Bad Godesberg (duration: approx. 1-2 hours)

A tram or regional train takes you to Bad Godesberg from Bonn city centre in only a few minutes. A walk around the town centre leads to the Redoute, the Draitschbrunnen fountain and the Godesburg castle. It is also worth exploring the district of fine villas, home to many embassies in the decades when Bonn was capital of the German Federal Republic.

Siebengebirge and Drachenfels (duration: 3-5 hours, depending on the programme)

Bonn is the ideal starting point for an excursion to the Siebengebirge, Germany's oldest nature reserve. You can travel by tram or boat to Königswinter and from there go walking in the Siebengebirge. The oldest rack-and-pinion railway in Germany will take you to the Drachenfels summit – or you can walk up. A wonderful view of the Rhine valley and surrounding area is the reward for the climb.

Halfway up the Drachenfels, surrounded by a landscaped park, lies the 19th-century mansion Schloss Drachenburg. There are guided tours at fixed times and on inquiry.



Trip on the Rhine (duration: approx. 3-5 hours depending on the route and programme)

Boats operated by the Weisse Flotte take you up the river, past romantic slopes to the wine towns of Königswinter and Linz with their picturesque half-timbered houses. Whichever place you visit – don't fail to try a glass of wine before returning to Bonn.

Between the different stops on the programme, you can decide which is your favourite among a large number of restaurants and cafés in Bonn, take a stroll through the city, or walk along the banks of the Rhine.
